

Service Never Goes Out of Style at Roanoke Feed Store

n the quaint town of Roanoke, Ala., you will discover M.L. Awbrey Supply Store, the oldest continuously operated family-owned supply store south of the Mason Dixon Line.

Owned and operated by Pat Awbrey, the store sells goods such as feed and seed, flowers, hardware, equipment, clothes and household items. Founded in 1909 by his grandfather, the store has stood the test of time and the challenges of big box stores. First handed down to Pat's father, then to Pat and a sibling, the store is now owned solely by Pat, who keeps it running with about seven employees, plus seasonal workers during the busy spring and summer.

The store began in the country before moving to its current location at 1038 Main St. in downtown Roanoke in 1909. In addition to the feed business, Pat's grandfather had a saw mill, cotton gin and grist mill, all of which depended on a hydraulic ram pump that sent water 50-60 feet up the mountain. More than a century later, modern technology has made it much easier to do business.

The secret to the store's longevity is customer service and diversified products and services. From the moment you walk in, you know that you are important to Awbrey's Supply Store. Employees quickly greet you, offering personal service and quality products.

Like Awbrey's, Alabama Farm Credit has stayed successful for a century and is working harder than ever to help customers in the agriculture industry ensure the success of their own farms and businesses.

"We are celebrating Farm Credit's centennial because of borrowers like Pat Awbrey," says Jim Tollison, Alabama Farm Credit's Talladega branch manager.
