RURAL COMMUNITIES SUPPORT FOOD BANK FUNDRAISER



In the last issue of Landscapes, we introduced AgTexas' effort to reduce hunger in Texas through a fundraising project for the Texas Food Bank Network. To publicize and support the effort, we announced plans to drive a John Deere 5045E farm tractor 1,000-plus miles. That three-month odyssey across our 23-county territory recently concluded.

And although funds were still pouring in and being tallied up at press time, we are grateful to announce that rural Texans raised thousands of dollars for food banks and food pantries in our rural communities.

Planning the Tour

The AgTexas employee team coordinated the drive and recruited more than 30 FFA chapters and 4-H clubs from across our trade area to host and lead the tractor caravan. Other aspects of the project included soliciting support from local businesses and planning the logistics of the drive, including the myriad details required to implement a project of this magnitude.

Leading the caravan was the John Deere tractor, accompanied by a Dodge pickup from Enterprise Leasing Company and a service trailer festooned with our corporate sponsors' logos. BE Implement Company, headquartered in Brownfield, and Bramlett Implement Inc. of Stephenville jointly donated the tractor, to be awarded to the participating FFA chapter that raised the most funds per member.

Planning a tour to approximately 30 communities where FFA and 4-H

members had committed to raise funds was no small feat.

"Many members of our AgTexas team spent hours planning the route, coordinating meals, booking hotel rooms and purchasing supplies to make the tractor drive a seamless process," commented Mike Metzger, regional vice president of the Lubbock branch.

"Coordinating schedules among so many FFA chapters and supporting businesses who were hosting local events was a logistical challenge, to say the least. It was a fun challenge though, and the knowledge that we were helping so many people in

need through the food banks certainly made the effort worthwhile," Metzger said.

Catching the Fever

Once the plan for a worthwhile service project began to gel, support for the idea became infectious. The Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT) — AgTexas' funding bank — jumped at the chance to get on the bandwagon: Upon hearing of the fundraising drive, FCBT Chief Executive Officer Larry Doyle offered to join in the effort. He even agreed to drive the tractor for one of the route's segments, providing a visual demonstration of support from the Texas Farm Credit District. Glen Robertson, mayor of Lubbock, and

The kick-off celebration was held at the Bayer Museum of Agriculture in Lubbock on Aug. 16. An enthusiastic and supportive crowd gathered to enjoy a hearty meal and see the caravan off on its initial leg of the tour. Over the next 11 weeks, the tractor crisscrossed the AgTexas territory, traveling through towns in the High Plains area and on to Stephenville, Burleson and surrounding communities in west-central Texas, before returning west.

Publicity was generated by local community events, parades, football games and activities planned specifically for the food bank cause by local FFA chapters and sponsors. The grand finale was held at the Texas Tech University vs. Oklahoma State University football game on Nov. 2.

AgTexas sincerely thanks all of the sponsors, workers, students and FFA chapters who volunteered their time and labor for this fundraising and hunger awareness effort.

A TRIBUTE TO RJ ROWDEN



The AgTexas family extends sincere condolences to the family of RJ Rowden. RJ was looking forward to his 97th birthday when he passed away last July. He was the oldest member of the AgTexas extended family, having farmed in the Brownfield area since the 1930s.

RJ began his Farm Credit business with Lubbock Production Credit Association (PCA) in 1946, when he borrowed \$1,600 for the purchase of a Moline tractor with a planter and lister at a total cost of \$2,400. His loan officer, Hugh Snodgrass, set him up on a one-year loan. That year was a bad one for farmers, and RJ's crop proceeds only generated \$1,000. However, he was determined to pay it all back, and with an extension of the loan and a lot of custom work, he was able to accomplish the task.

RJ was a lifelong supporter of Farm Credit and imparted countless bits of wit and wisdom to those who knew him. During a 2006 program honoring him for his 60 years of Farm Credit membership, he encouraged AgTexas to continue helping young farmers. He also advised the members to be open and truthful, stating his heartfelt belief that PCA is always honest in return. In conclusion, he said, “I pray God's blessing on this association and its employees, and encourage you all to continue growing the world of agriculture.”

We remember and honor RJ for the loyalty and dedication that he personally provided this organization, as well as the influence he has had in bringing subsequent generations of family members and others in the farming community to AgTexas. He will be missed.
