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

Keith Post Visits Washington During Farm Credit 100 Week

The annual Farm Credit Association Leadership Program was extra special for this year's participants: It coincided with Farm Credit 100 Week, a celebration of the Farm Credit System's centennial in Washington, D.C.

The centennial events in mid-June included a congressional reception at the Library of Congress featuring Farm Credit customers' products. Program participants also visited with five senators, 10 congressmen and several congressional staff members.

All of that was in addition to the regular leadership program, which took Farm Credit employees to financial and policy organizations in the New York City area and Washington, D.C., to show them how the Farm Credit System attracts money from Wall Street and delivers it to rural America.

"The Association Leadership Program was unique and very informative," said Post. Taking the Lead

Third-Generation Farmer Dedicated to Agriculture, Leadership

ometimes a single decision can change

the course of history.

That's just what happened when Alan Lawson's grandfather, an electrical engineer with a degree from Purdue University, decided to buy a farm in the 1930s in rural Louisiana. He grew rice, raised cattle and instilled a love of farming in his family that exists to this day, along with the belief in a good education and a gift for leadership in

his community.

Lawson's dad, after college — and a stint in the U.S. Navy — returned to the farm, and Lawson later followed suit.

"When I was young, I was always interested in what was happening on the farm," he says. So, after earning a degree in agricultural business from Louisiana State University, he also chose to be a farmer.

Today, in partnership with his dad, he grows 1,100 acres of rice, 300 acres of soybeans, 850 acres of crawfish and 50 head of cattle on his farm in Crowley, La.

Born to Lead

Following in his grandfather's and father's footsteps, Lawson has taken the lead in his community, embracing new and innovative technology and serving as president of the Acadia Parish Rice Growers' Association. He also is a graduate of the LSU AgCenter Agricultural Leadership Program.

"My grandfather had one of the first combines in our area, and built his own ricedrying facility," he says. "And my father was the first one in our community to buy a laser leveling system."

As his farming operation has grown, Lawson has adopted state-of-the-art technology, including GPS and auto-steer in his farm equipment.

Honored as Young Leader

In 2015, Louisiana Land Bank selected Lawson to be a part of the prestigious Farm Credit Young Leaders Program. The program takes young leaders to financial and policy organizations in the New York City area and Washington, D.C., to show them how the Farm Credit System attracts money from Wall Street and delivers it to rural America.

"The trip was eye-opening," he says. "You see just how many people are involved behind the scenes to get money to the Land Bank and out to our rural communities."

Looking Ahead

Lawson is excited about his plans to develop a crawfish processing plant to efficiently peel, pack and freeze crawfish, thereby increasing the shelf life of his crop.

And he notes that his 10-year-old son is showing an interest in the farm, particularly in the machinery — so maybe, just maybe, there will be a fourth-generation Lawson farmer down the road.
