BOARD NEWS: Two Directors Re-Elected

Central Texas Farm Credit staff members, directors and customers traveled to Washington, D.C., in late July for Farm Credit Week, a gathering of 630 Farm Credit representatives from around the country. This exciting event included the launch of a national marketing campaign showcasing Farm Credit's customers — One Mission. Many Voices. — as well as meetings with elected officials about the importance of passing a strong farm bill when the current legislation expires in September 2018.

U.S. Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue and Sen. Pat Roberts, chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, welcomed the Farm Credit attendees to the nation's capital in speeches that highlighted upcoming farm policy hearings and the importance of supporting agriculture and rural communities with financing and essential infrastructure.

Association representatives then met with Rep. Mike Conaway of Texas, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, as well as Rep. Jodey Arrington, Sen. John Cornyn and Sen. Ted Cruz.

Central Texas CEO Boyd "Jimmy" Chambers, Director Steven Lehrmann and his wife, Karen, and Marketing Manager Jennifer Spraberry were joined

on the trip by customers Cade and Jessica Richmond of DeLeon and LeMoine Knox of Coleman. During their visit to Capitol Hill, Rep. Conaway asked the Richmonds and Knox about their ag operations and challenges, and encouraged farmers and ranchers to share their experiences and policy needs with elected officials well in advance of next year's farm bill hearings.

While in D.C., Knox represented our association in the 2017 Farm Credit Young Leaders Program, an annual trip to Washington and New York City in which young customers learn how Farm Credit uses its cooperative structure and unique funding mechanism to support agriculture and rural communities. An attorney and fifth-generation rancher, she holds a certificate in ranch management from Texas Christian University, and is active in the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association and the National Cattlemen's Beef Association.
